

# Week 6 Student Study Guide

**Title:** The Valley of Dry Bones – Resurrection, Revival, and Hope

**Primary Text:** Ezekiel 37 (KJV)

## Historical & Literary Context

Ezekiel 37 is delivered to a people who believe their national and spiritual future is finished. The exile has produced hopelessness, not repentance. God responds not with rebuke but with a vision of resurrection. This chapter marks a decisive shift from judgment to restoration and prepares the way for final renewal promises later in the book.

## Theological Exposition

The valley of dry bones represents Israel's complete loss of hope—bones are not merely dead, they are very dry. God's question, 'Can these bones live?' reframes impossibility through divine power. Restoration occurs through the proclamation of the Word and the movement of the Spirit. Word without Spirit produces structure without life; Spirit without Word lacks direction. Together, they bring resurrection.

The vision is explicitly interpreted as national restoration, yet it also establishes a pattern for spiritual renewal. God restores identity, community, and purpose before restoring land. This passage becomes foundational for later resurrection theology.
